SCOTT LANG, KEYNOTE SPEAKER For over a decade Scott Lang has been educating and entertaining audiences of all ages. As a nationally known leadership trainer, Scott conducts over 120 workshops annually and works with some of our country's finest educational groups and performing ensembles. As a highly decorated veteran teacher of sixteen years Scott's bands have had many notable performances including the Pasadena Tournament of Rose Parade, the Music Educators National Biennial Conference and for the President of the United States, William Jefferson Clinton.

Scott is a well-regarded author with over ten publications to his credit including; Seriously?!, Leader of the Band, Leadership Success, Leadership Travel Guide, Leadership Survival Guide, Sound Leadership and is the creator of the highly successful Be Part of the Music series.

Mr. Lang currently resides in Chandler, Arizona with his beautiful wife Leah and their sons, Brayden, Evan and their highly irrational Golden Retriever Rexie. He has breathed in and out approximately 264 million times and plans to keep on doing so until he doubles that number.

CATE ALLS | Catie Alls is in her ninth year of teaching adapted music at Clare Woods Academy, an alternative day school in Wheaton, Illinois, serving students ages 5-22 in the Chicagoland area. Catie received her bachelor's degree in music education from McKendree University. While in the honors program there, Catie did a focused study on supporting students with autism spectrum disorder in instrumental ensembles. In addition to teaching adapted general music, choir, percussion ensemble, and contemporary band she also directs Clare Woods Academy's dance team, annual winter concert, and annual spring musical. Catie has presented across the state for ILMEA on the topic of adapted music and strongly believes that every child is deserving of an inclusive and accessible musical education.

SARAH BARTOLOME Dr. Bartolome previously held the position of assistant professor of music education at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. She holds a BM in voice performance and music education from Ithaca College, an MM in music education with a concentration in voice performance and pedagogy from Northwestern University, and a PhD in music education from the University of Washington. Her research interests include children's musical culture, ethnomusicology, choral culture from a global perspective, service-learning in higher education, and music teacher preparation. She has published articles in such journals as the Journal of Research in Music Education, Research Studies in Music Education and the Music Educators Journal.

MACKENZIE BUFIS Instrumental music teacher in Downers Grove District 58 from 2010-2015. Her teaching responsibilities included 4th-8th grade orchestra, beginning and intermediate band, middle school Chamber Strings and Orchestra Director at Herrick Middle School. She has served as a curriculum development consultant for District 58 and continues teaching as a substitute and in her private studio. For the last ten years, Mrs. Bufis has served as an ILMEA Percussion Coordinator. Mrs. Bufis earned her degree in Music Education from the University of Illinois in 2010, where she performed in the percussion studio, Marching Illini and Balinese Gamelan ensemble. She currently performs as a member of The Agape Ringers professional handbell ensemble and earns grey hairs raising her three children.



CRISTI CARY MILLER | Cristi Miller is highly regarded across the United States as a master teacher, conductor and composer. After graduating from Oklahoma State University, she began her teaching career instructing grades 7-12. She eventually moved to the Putnam City School system in 1989 where she worked in the elementary classroom for 21 years. During her time at Putnam City, she was the co-director of the Putnam City Honor Choir. This chorus was highly regarded in their area, winning many honors at festivals and competitions.

In 2008, Cristi became a National Board Certified Teacher and in 2010, Mrs. Miller became a part of the Fine Arts Staff at Heritage Hall Schools in the Oklahoma City area where she teaches middle school music. Many of her students have received All-State honors through her leadership and her choirs have maintained superior ratings at statewide contests.

Mrs. Miller's honors include Putnam City Teacher of the Year, Putnam City "Excellent Educator" Award, Putnam City PTA Teacher of the Year and OMEA Exemplary Teacher. In addition, in 2014 she will be inducted into the OMEA Hall of Fame. She has numerous choral pieces and books in publication through the Hal Leonard Corporation and has also been the recipient of several ASCAP awards for her music. Cristi and her husband, Rick, live in Oklahoma City.

JULIE DUTY | Julie completed her undergraduate degree at Arizona State University in 1998, earning a Bachelor of Music in Music Education. She taught high school and middle school band and served as a mentor teacher for nine years in Arizona. Since leaving the classroom, Julie has remained dedicated to music education and community service, and currently serves as the founder and executive director of United Sound, Inc. working with teachers, parents, and school administrators to bring meaningful participation and inclusivity to the instrumental music classroom.

Julie is still an active musician, performing in the Tempe Symphonic Wind Ensemble for the past twenty consecutive years. She works regularly for the Arizona Band and Orchestra Director's Association as a judge and adjudicator for state-wide events, and is a mother to three adorable musicians of her own.

SUE KEEBLE Susan is general music specialist in the Mahomet-Seymour Schools. She is past President of the Heart of Illinois Orff Chapter and holds all three levels of certification in Orff-Schulwerk, Kodaly Level One certification, and one level of World Music Drumming. Ms. Keeble has presented for the Illinois Music Educators Association on both the local and state levels and on the national level in Denver, Colorado and in Salt Lake City, Utah for the American Orff Schulwerk Conference.

She is a National Board Certified teacher and completed her music education at Northern Illinois University and Northwestern University.



PAUL MARCHESE Paul Marchese is a music educator, conductor, and performer who is distracted very easily, or has diverse experiences and interests (depending on who is asked). He has taught at every level, from elementary to college, with an emphasis in vocal and general music. Marchese currently teaches Chorus and General Music at Hadley Junior High School in Glen Ellyn District 41. Since his hire in 2011, he has created the curricular choral program and several general music classes, including Ukulele, Guitar, and Music Technology.

Mr. Marchese has a particular interest in exploring avenues of music-making that build upon the students' interests. As the interest in ukulele grew in the program, he created Triple Fret, an extra-curricular fretted orchestra incorporating ukulele, mandolin, tenor guitar, guitar and bass. This ensemble has performed at the Illinois Music Educators Conference and was able to work with international ukulele virtuoso James Hill on more than one occasion.

Outside of school, Marchese directs the DeKalb Festival Chorus in DeKalb, Illinois, directs the DeKalb Homeschool Ukulele Orchestra, and can occasionally be caught building and playing his Cigar Box guitars and ukuleles.

As a performer, Paul has been fortunate to perform in a number of operas and musicals, sung with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at Ravinia, and plays and arranges for the Wild Blue Ukulele Orchestra. He has arranged a number of works for Ukulele and Fretted Orchestras, and continues to develop a multi-media ukulele method that is currently being used by other districts.

Paul lives in DeKalb with his wife and four kids, holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Carthage College, and a Master of Music from the University of Nebraska, and somehow maintains the general appearance of sanity.

JOHN MLYNCZAK John has an extensive range of experiences in music education and technology. Currently he is Managing Director of Noteflight, a Hal Leonard company, President of the Technology Institute of Music Educators (TI:ME), and Adjunct Professor of Music Technology at Louisiana State University.
